The school day begins as we learn to sort our belongings independently and self-register to show we are here. We have focused time on the carpet where we have a daily phonics session and practise our maths skills.



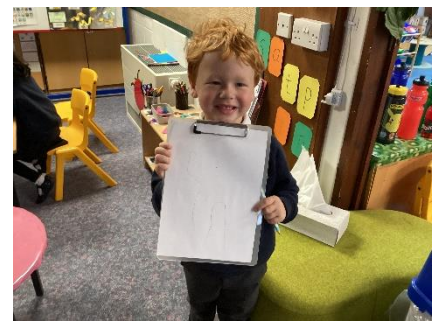

Some days we have the bikes and trikes out and we make a car wash.



We have a rolling snack for if you are hungry throughout the morning. Don't worry, we always remind the children. They have time for a snack, milk and story before 11:00am.

We have a PE session once a week where we take part in activities and use sport equipment like balls, bean bags and the large climbing equipment.



We spend time in the forest area and go to a weekly forest school session where we learn lots of skills and develop a love of outdoor learning and the environment.
