This week you need to produce a homework linked to the book we have been studying: A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens. You have three options from which to choose. This is an extended homework task. You are expected to spend time on it each week and produce an impressive final piece. As before, please take a picture of the finished piece and send it to us.

Design a Christmas card and write a letter.

Design a Christmas card that might have been sent during Victorian times. This card is to be from Scrooge to his nephew, Fred. Within the card, there needs to be a letter showing remorse and explaining how he has changed since the visits from the ghosts.



Make a model.

Using a shoe box or box of similar size, create a model of the inside of one of these three rooms:


- Scrooge's counting house
- Scrooge's bedroom
- The Cratchit's

You must use description from the text of these settings and your knowledge of Victorian life to make this as realistic as possible



Story board with animation.

Using a computer and images online, create a story board of the events in A Christmas Carol. You need to include at least 12 boxes or sections



showing different events of the story (in order!).

Each section will need to have a picture and text to explain what is happening.

You may complete this in a word document or as a presentation such as powerpoint.

In addition, you may make an animation of this story board for the class to watch.
