Mark talks to you about why keeping your audience in mind is key to good writing. He asks you to come up with a list of people for whom they could write a poem as a gift and tells you about the techniques he uses including rhyme, repetition and similes. He reads a poem that he wrote for his wife, 'Your love is like a blanket that always keeps me warm' and asks you to choose someone who makes them smile. Making sure that the audience will understand the language, Mark takes the poem line by line, considering how to use metaphors, trying to make work original and connecting with the intended audience. All of these techniques can be used to write a rap which can then be performed!
