

EYFS BUSY CHOOSING ACTIVITIES for 6th July

Some of these activities can be repeated multiple times.

Create your own bear hunt puppets and use them to retell the story. You could put on a show – making tickets to give out to family members!	Make a story map of Bear hunt showing where the family goes. You could add real grass and mix mud paint!	Do some research about different types of bears. You could look in a book, use the internet or maybe ask Alexa! Write down your bear facts!	Use 2 tubes to make some binoculars for your own bear hunt! Go for a walk with them and look out for bears!	Take your favourite teddies and favourite stories and look at your books together.	Create the different scenes from the story. You could build a rock cave, fill a container with water and create squelchy mud.	Hide a toy or teddy in a secret spot and write clues for a family member to find the bear! You could make the clues on footprint paper.	Make music that sounds like parts of the book! What could make the swishy swashy sound? The stumble trip sound?
GET BUILDING! Construct a new home for the bear – will you use pebbles for a cave? Perhaps he wants a Lego house and pool? Draw a design first and then try to build from that.	GET COOKING! What recipes could you make inspired by the bear hunt story? Bear biscuits? Mud pies?	GET ACTIVE Bear hunt exercises! Go for long strides or practise jumping over roots as you stomp through the forest. Create your own too!	GET SKETCHY! Find some longer grass and sit close by (or lie in it) and observe the wildlife, sketching what you see.	GET CRAFTY Make a worry doll! Use a stick, pipe cleaners/wool to create a worry doll. You can write down your worries and give them to your worry doll.	GET CREATIVE Design a bear! What would your bear be like? Design a giant and add labels/ captions e.g. fluffy ears, he is brown	GET MESSY Make some mud of a thick consistency or brown playdough and create your own bears! You could use rocks to build them a cave.	ACTS OF KINDNESS Draw a picture with a nice message and post it or deliver it to a friend, classmate or family member.
